

The Museo Minero of La Unión is an essential stop for **history lovers**. The unique character of the museum offers a **special experience** for visitors, who will learn first-hand about the importance that the **mining industry** has had in this municipality for more than **2,000 years**.

The visit is divided into 5 areas in which a part of the magnificent collection of the Museo Minero is exhibited, made up of more than 300 objects linked to mining and metallurgical activity in the 19th and 20th centuries and 200 minerals, both from the Sierra Minera Cartagena-La Unión and from other parts of the Iberian Peninsula.




1. ENTRANCE / 2. MULTI-PURPOSE ROOM / 3. WC / 4. E1 / 5. E2
